

GENERAL Election

A SPECIAL BRIEFING FROM LONDON COMMUNICATIONS AGENCY – 7 MAY 2010

- **Hung Parliament as predicted**
- **Turnout up – over 75% in some London seats**
- **Big names topple nationally**
- **Lib Dem surge falters**
- **Conservatives struggle in the South West and in London**
- **End of Uniform National Swing**

As we have been predicting for some two years, the result of the General Election is a hung parliament – the first since 1974. The Conservatives are currently forecast to be the largest party holding over 300 seats, but not the 326 they need for an outright majority.

Turnout across the country was generally up an average 4% on 2005 to 65% and it will be interesting to see how this impacts on the London borough results later today.

As expected it was a night of significant Labour losses and a number of recent ministers have lost their seats including Charles Clarke, Jacqui Smith, Bill Rammell, Mike O'Brien, Ann Keen and Shahid Malik. Ed Balls held on with a majority of just over 1,000 votes. The picture for Labour in London is somewhat less bleak with Margaret Hodge holding off the BNP in Barking and Karen Buck, Emily Thornberry, Sadiq Khan, Andrew Slaughter, Jim Fitzpatrick and Glenda Jackson (by just 42 votes!) all holding on to their seats.

For the Liberal Democrats nationally, Lembit Opik and Evan Harris lost their seats and the party failed to capitalise on the apparent post-TV debate surge. In London, they lost Richmond Park to Zac Goldsmith and failed to take Islington South, however, they won Brent Central with a huge swing off Labour and held on to Kingston and Surbiton, Sutton and Cheam and Carshalton and Wallington.

The Tories have had a patchy night, winning some seats way beyond the 117 swing such as Kingswood, Montgomeryshire and Cannock Chase. In London they're celebrating wins in Richmond Park, Brentford and Isleworth, Harrow East and Margaret Thatcher's old stomping ground of Finchley and Golders Green but will be sorely disappointed with the results in Westminster North – where Labour's Karen Buck has held on - and in Hammersmith, where Tory golden boy Shaun Bailey was beaten by Labour incumbent Andy Slaughter.

Pundits, experts and amateurs alike agreed early on that this election was not following any obvious pattern and that we may well be witnessing the end of the 'Uniform National Swing'. This certainly seems to be the case with results like the 21.8% swing from Labour to Liberal Democrat in Redcar and the 13.2% swing towards the Tories in Montgomeryshire that ousted Lembit Opik – despite the 5.2% national average Labour to Tory swing.

Could it be that the debates and soundbites are not as important as a strong effort on the ground and an emphasis on local issues? It is certainly true that everyone, including the pollsters, overestimated the Liberal Democrat swing and no one could have predicted anomalies like Emily Thornberry's extraordinary ten-fold increase of her majority in Labour-held Islington South and Finsbury. Nor that Brighton Pavilion would give the country its first ever Green Party MP.
